Next Meeting - Dr. Fred Cerise,
Parkland Health and Hospital System Chief Executive Officer

## NaPro Technology: A New Approach to Women's Health



This past January 8th, Dr. Charlie Cassidy discussed Napro Technology. In short, Napro technology leverages knowledge of a woman's cycle to predict fertility, but also through understanding each woman's particular cycle, it can be used to diagnose and treat conditions not normally evaluated in traditional gynecologic practice. For example, with infertile couples, most undergo an baseline set of evaluations and then are referred for In Vitro Fertilization to acheive pregnancy. But in NaPro Technology, the female undergoes more profound hormone profiling to help diagnose further underlying causes of infertility and thereby treat conditions that might impede pregnancy. Studies done with NaPro technology actually have proven it to be more successful than IVF. NaPro technology also is better equipped to more fully evaluate underlying gynecologic disease (prolactinoma, PCOS, endometriosis, etc.) rather than "mask" symptoms through oral contraception.
