

Next Meeting: Christian Perspectives on Suffering



In the next meeting (on June 5), Dr. Robert Collins will speak on the topic of <u>Christian Perspectives</u> on <u>Suffering</u>. Working as an oncologist, he has many experiences dealing with suffering for both the patient and the physician. He will offer a unique glimpse into his reflections on the topic.

Dr. Collins leads the Hematologic Malignancies/Blood and Marrow Transplantation Program and the combined Adult/Pediatric Stem Cell Transplant Program at UT Southwestern Medical Center. He is holder of the Sydney and J.L. Huffines Distinguished Chair in Cancer Research and the H. Lloyd and Willye Skaggs Professorship in Medical Research. He is also the faculty advisor to the St. Basil Society, the UT Southwestern Catholic student association.

This month Dr. Abigail Nitschke (second year resident at Childrens Medical Center) spoke about her recent mission trip to Haiti. The plight of Haiti is unusual - in addition to a lack of healthcare resources and accessibility there is limited infrastructure, and no public education nor public welfare programs.



She spoke of her experiences providing healthcare in a rural village where doctors are available only every six months and there are no modern roads, electricity nor running water; however the people of Haiti are incredibly resilient and were grateful for the presence of missionaries. Common diseases seen in Haiti included malnutrition, fungal disease, parasitic disease, hypertension and a host of infectious diseases. She mentioned poignant cases such the patients she sees suffering from kwashiorkor who require transport to feeding centers or patients with swollen abdomens who develop intestinal obstruction from parasites.
