Next meeting's topic: Physician Pro Life Testimony



Dr. Mayra Thompson recently testified in Austin at the current Texas Legislative session this past April. She provided expert testimony regarding Senate Bill 537, proposing to require that abortion facilities meet the same standards of care as ambulatory surgical centers.

Dr. Thompson will share her experience when she testified and also her wisdom with regards to the issue of abortion.

Dr. Thompson is an associate professor of Obstetrics and Gynecology at UT Southwestern and practices at the Lowe Foundation Center for Women's Preventative Health Care.

Last month a panel of 5 physicians shared their experiences in the expression of Catholicity in everyday, medical practice. Dr. Munir Hazbun (Critical Care and Pulmonology, Southwest Pulmonary Associates), discussed the importance of professionalism and integrity in practice and how he must engage in an active prayer life for sustenance.

Dr. Tya-May Julien (Gastroenterology, Baylor) shared how she openly witnessed to her faith by praying regularly with her patients and her staff, keeping Bibles and prayer cards in the office and in patient rooms, and openly discussing her faith in her daily routine.

“present” to patients – to share in their suffering and joys, to be in solidarity to them – and not just write prescriptions.

Dr. BJ Lanser (Chief Resident, Children’s Medical Center, Fellowship next year in Allergy/Immunology) shared his need for an active prayer life, engaging in resources such as Magnificat, to supplement his daily needs. He mentioned that it was not difficult for him to remain firm on the teaching of the Church in situations that might compromise his Catholicity.

Dr. Tom Andrews (UTSW Cardiology, Parkland) discussed that performing small acts of mortification – such as returning phone calls, filling out paper work, etc. – augmented his spiritual life and were seen by him as a way of service to the poor. The sanctification of our work as physicians is part of our journey towards God. He regularly receives spiritual direction from Opus Dei and actually found his way into the Church through fellow Cardiologists who he practices with.
